Session #1

Supporting Marginalized Counselors and Avoiding Invalidation

Marginalized counselors are at risk for experiencing instances of racism and other forms of discrimination in the workplace. This can come from clients who are navigating their own struggles as well as invalidating systems and supervision within the workplace. Additionally, white counselors may invalidate these experiences in their best attempts to help. This presentation will discuss strategies to check power and privilege in the workplace while allowing for open discussion to support marginalized counselors. This presentation will also provide a framework for companies to navigate these experiences in a supportive and affirming manner.

- Review the internal conceptualization of cultural humility and how this perspective manifests by enhanced individual and community treatment.
- Identify ways that counselors can provide support and education between each other regarding instances where unchecked power and privilege negatively impacts treatment.
- Present strategies to infuse such discussions in the workplace.

Fredrick Dombrowski is the AMHCA President and has experience treating those living with co-occurring disorders since 1998. Currently a Department Chair at the University of Bridgeport, he is focused on experiential learning through a perspective of cultural humility. He has won several awards for his work with marginalized populations.

Session #2

Military Service Members and Veterans in Counseling: Reclaiming, Reinventing, Liberating

Join us for a dynamic, interactive presentation focusing on the needs of military service members and veterans who come to counseling! Military service members, veterans, their spouses, their children, and their extended families have unique experiences and needs that are distinct from their civilian counterparts. We will discuss how the experiences of service members and their families shape their needs in counseling and will discuss evidence-based practices aligned with meeting these needs. The presenters will demonstrate military-aware, trauma-informed approaches and provide opportunities for attendees to learn and try new skills aimed at supporting service members, veterans, and their families.

- Learn to take an emic perspective to understand the needs of military service members, veterans, and their families
- Analyze and evaluate methods of meeting the needs of military service members and their families
- Learn to make informed choices about treatment modalities aimed at meeting the needs of service members and their families
- Practice counseling applications specifically designed to meet the needs of military service members and their families.

Dr. Laurie Bonjo currently serves as program coordinator of the doctoral program in Counselor Education and Supervision at Southern Connecticut State University, where she is an associate professor. Dr. Bonjo earned a master's degree in counseling from Penn State University and a Ph.D. in Counselor Education and Supervision from Old Dominion University. Dr. Bonjo's teaching and research interests include decolonization and liberation practices with minority populations, creating space for youth empowerment, clinical applications, and disrupting dysfunctional paradigms.

Brett Santo is currently a graduate student in the Clinical Mental Health Counseling program at Southern Connecticut State University and serves as the President-Elect for the Connecticut Mental Health Counselors Association (CMHCA). Brett's research interests include trauma, neurodivergence, LGBTGEQIAP2S+ issues, sex and sexuality counseling, and anti-racist practices.

Session #3

Ethics for Counselors: Revisiting the ACA Code of Ethics

Counselors will have an opportunity to revisit the ACA Code of Ethics, including how to make an effective decision when faced with an ethical quandary. Real life examples will be used as we review what every counselor needs to know. Focus will be placed on self-care and telemental health.

- Leave confident in accessing the ACA Code of Ethics and use it to help guide daily practice
- Understand the ethics of telemental health
- Learn to navigate an ethical decision-making process using an ethical decision-making model

Dr. Evans Zalewski has been teaching ethics to counseling students for the past several years and has presented nationally on ethical topics.
